It was during this period that Adams communicated her thoughts and ideas to her husband, John Adams, who later became the second President of the United States.

John Adams, who had recently emerged from a war that secured our freedom to establish the United States of America, harbored reservations about engaging in another conflict. However, he did hold a belief in the rights of women.

The letter of Abigail to her husband early April 1776:

Do not put such unlimited power into the hands of the husbands. Remember, all men would be tyrants if they could."

His response mid April 1776:

"We know better than to repeal our masculine systems. Although they are in full force, you know they are little more than theory. We are obliged to go softly. And in practice you know we are the subjects. We only have the names of masters."

And our second President wrote when he became president on Nov 1800: "I pray heaven to bestow the best of blessings on this house. May none but honest and wise men ever rule under this roof."

Although their contributions to women's rights were limited, their letters serve as a

testament to the arduous struggles faced by minorities and women in the pursuit of freedom. Two and a half centuries later, we have lost sight of the immense difficulty in achieving human decency for all beings. Regardless of our trajectory, the foundation of progress or regression lies in our interactions with others, as human behavior is malleable and akin to a contagious virus.

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
